Annual Show

As most of you have already heard, our Annual Exhibit and Show, scheduled for Nov 1-2, has been cancelled. The Edison-Ford Winter Estates is undergoing major construction, and they have begun the work by eliminating Larchmont Street. They are in the process of removing all the topsoil, and will begin the next phase of digging it up to install new drainage, sewage and water pipes, and electricity. Including parking lot improvements, this project will take several months. That left us with a parking problem. Virginia Ave. is the only other street bordering the Berne Davis Gardens, and is a fairly short street that cannot accommodate much more than 20-30 vehicles. It is unclear if the Gardens will be open for our Spring Auction. All regular club meetings will continue as scheduled.

Repotting Time Hint from Martha

REPOTTING TIME IS ALMOST OVER FOR MOST OF OUR TROPICALS!

Be careful! If night temperatures are consistently 60 degrees or up, it is still safe to repot most tropicals. When night temperatures begin to fluctuate, don't repot. There will still be repotting for deciduous, dormant trees. Always check your information about repotting time before trying.

It's Almost Wiring Time

I know that anytime is wiring time, but my favorite is November/December. Why? Depending on when night temperatures move to consistently low 50's or 40's, wire can stay on trees for up to 3 months. Because of what we call cold weather, growth slows way down and lessens the chance of wire cuts. I love that!

"Martha's Corner"

Each month we will feature one species. It is selected based on the month that it may need your attention. Several years ago, Martha Goff wrote a voluminous work called <u>Tropical Green Sheets</u>. In this two-volume set, Martha goes to great length to detail everything about hundreds of trees.... Type, Species, Soil, pH, watering and much, much more. You can purchase Tropical Green Sheets at Wigert's Nursery or Bonsai Jack.

Ficus (Ficus benjamina)

History:

Ficus are members of the Moraceae family of plants. There are reported to be over 1,500 species of Ficus, over 800 of these being trees. They are native to southern Asia and India but grow successfully in any tropical climate. In general, the ficus have gummy sap (it "bleeds" when injured), stipules cover and protect new leaves as they emerge and fall away, aerial roots, and fruit (figs). Although ficus grow all over the tropics, they are most often associated with Taiwan. That region uses the fig as one of their main bonsai materials. For the tropics, Ficus is probably the most rewarding plant. Even for the novice, it is very forgiving. The Ficus grows quickly, leaf reduction is generally easy, and it fits a number of different styles. The list of those available and suitable to bonsai is lengthy. The care of all Ficus is, generally speaking, similar. Read More.
